Women

he life of a middle-class woman was very restricted. Girls grew up to become wives and mothers but they did not usually have a job. There were almost no women doctors or lawyers or engineers. The only profession really open to women was teaching.



If they were not well-connected to rich families, it was common for educated middle-class girls – such as Jane Eyre and Miss Temple – to become teachers or governesses.

Middle-class families usually had servants. Many women from poorer families lived and worked in the houses of the rich (as Bessie worked for Mrs Reed).



Most ordinary working-class women had very hard lives. In the country they worked in the fields next to the men. In the cities they worked in the factories. England was experiencing the Industrial Revolution at that time. Women, and even young children, were employed in the new cotton mills and down in the coalmines.




Marriage

arriage was the most important event in a woman's life.

It established her position in society. Parents worked hard to arrange a "good" marriage for their daughters.

Marriage usually lasted for the whole of a person's life. Victorian society did not approve of divorce or separation and they were not common. It was also a scandal in Victorian society if a man and a woman lived together without getting married. This helps to explain why Jane ran away from Thornfield Hall after she found out about Rochester's marriage to Bertha.



Schools

ducation was not organized by the government as it is today. Schools were often owned by individual people or by the church (such as St John's village school). Parents often had to pay to send their children to school. There were also "charity schools" for orphans or children from poor families (like Lowood School in the story). Generous people contributed money to set up institutions like these.

Boarding schools, in which children lived as well as studied, were common. As an alternative, many rich families employed a private teacher (a "governess") to live in their homes and teach only their children.



School discipline was very strict and children were regularly beaten. However attending school was not obligatory. A lot of children from poor families, especially girls, had no education at all and could not read or write.

Health

llness and early death were very common, especially among the poor. Most people today live for 75-80 years. But in Victorian England the average life was only about 40 years.

There were many reasons for this, including insufficient food and bad sanitary conditions, especially in the growing industrial cities. There were not many hospitals and doctors. Medical treatment was expensive and it was not as advanced as it is today. Doctors often did not know the real cause of a disease or how to cure it. Helen Burns probably died of tuberculosis, caused by poor food and living conditions. This disease is very infectious and killed millions of people in the 19th century. Nobody knew how to treat people who were mentally ill (such as Mrs Rochester in the story). The science of psychology was only beginning in this period and there was no real understanding of the causes of insanity. It was a terrible disgrace for a family to have someone who was "mad". It was common to lock up such people in institutions, where they were often forgotten.

《简·爱》的世界: 维多利亚时代的英格兰

女性

维多利亚时代,中产阶级女性的生活范围很窄,女孩们长大后便为人妻、做人母,很少在外面从事工作,几乎没有女性的医生、律师或工程师。社会对她们开放的唯一职业就是教师,如果没有与富有家庭的亲缘关系,那些受过教育的中产阶级女性,如简·爱和坦普尔小姐,往往到学校执教或者成为家庭教师。

中产阶级家庭通常雇有佣人,许多家境贫穷的女性住在富有的人家,为他们 工作(如贝茜受雇于里德太太)。

大多数普通工人阶级的女性生活得异常艰苦,她们在农田里与男人并肩耕作, 在城市里则劳碌于工厂。那个时代的英国正在经历工业革命,从新的棉纺厂到煤矿 矿井都可以看到女性雇工甚至童工。

婚姻

女性一生中最重要的一件事情莫过于婚姻。婚姻可以确立女性的社会地位,而且一桩婚姻往往是一辈子的事情,所以父母们都竭尽全力为自己的女儿安排一桩"好"的婚姻。维多利亚时代的社会不认同离婚或分居,因此这样的事情很少发生。如果男女之间未结婚就住在一起简直是个丑闻。这就有助于我们理解为什么简·爱发现罗切斯特已和伯莎结婚后毅然离开了桑菲尔德府。

学校

和现在不同,维多利亚时代的教育机构不是由政府建立的,学校归个人或教堂所有(如圣·约翰开办的乡村学校)。父母需要花钱供孩子读书。当时还有为孤儿或家境贫穷的孩子开立的慈善学校(如故事中的罗沃德学校),这样的机构通常由社会上愿意慷慨解囊的人士捐款建立。

同时,既供孩子们学习又供住宿的寄宿学校也相当普遍。此外,许多富有家庭也会用另外一种方式,即雇佣私人教师(家庭教师),并安排教师住在家里教导孩子功课。

学校的纪律通常非常严格,孩子们挨打是家常便饭。然而上学并非是强制性的,许多贫困家庭的儿童,特别是女孩从未接受过教育,既不会读书更不会写字。

健康

在维多利亚时代,疾病和早逝非常普遍,这在贫困人群中尤为常见。现在大多数人的寿命是75—80岁,而在维多利亚时代的英格兰平均寿命仅为40岁。原因是多种多样的,包括食物供给短缺、卫生条件恶劣,特别是那些发展中的工业城市的

情况更为糟糕。当时没有多少家医院,医生也为数不多,医疗费用昂贵,医疗条件和现代无法相比,医生往往无法确定病因和有效的治疗方法。故事中的海伦·彭斯很可能是死于肺结核,由当时恶劣的伙食和住宿条件所致。这种疾病的传染性很强,在十九世纪有数以千万人死于该病。当时也没有人知道如何治疗精神病患者(例如故事中的罗切斯特夫人)。心理学研究刚刚起步,对于精神疾病的病因也没有正确的理解。当时如果某个人有"精神病",全家人都会觉得十分耻辱,因此通常把这样的病人关在专门的机构里,往往为世人所遗忘。

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
